FIRST, THE HAPPY NEWS!

Our forthcoming book lead by Jay Belsky is being translated to Russian (!), also translated to Maori (thanks to Richie for arranging this), and licensed as an audiobook (so you don't have to actually READ it). But printing is delayed till August. Shipping is commandeered for PPE, so publishers are holding back on books.

Collecting data on COVID19 in E-Risk. Jo Freeman Henchy and Becky Gray began contacting E-Risk twins personally this week to push out our survey, which has questions about COVID19, as well as questions about other aspects of their lives. Data should be available in summer. Ideas for using them welcome. Jo reports: I really enjoyed making the first bit of contact with the twins this week. It's nice to have something else to do and a change from cooking, cleaning and home schooling. Our home school has a heavy art bias at the moment, because I'm not so good at math! Rob is busy as he works for the NHS and has been securing PPE for all the GP's and HCA's in Peterborough, using our car to deliver it all so it was bursting with face masks last week! BECKY adds: I love the contact with twins, and the changing dynamics from our cheeky 25 year olds! Like the time I called the ones who were at the pub (pissed) and did all their best efforts to try to get me to go there to do the survey....and how they hung up on me when I told them they really wouldn't want me there, as I was one of the originals who saw them when they were 4 years old!!

Aaron submitted a small grant application to the Lafitte Foundation, to use the E-Risk COVID19 data to look at neighborhood factors in relation geo-coded access to greenspace, and behavior/mental health.

The NZ Ministry of Health kindly agreed to give Leah and Barry direct access to the entire population's hospital records. The NZIDI is still shut down, but very soon Leah's stalled project can move again! Here's Barry and Smooch at home, note the kiwi bird in the background.
